Report of the Postmaster-General for the Year ended the 31st December, 1908.

THE HONOURABLE THE COLONIAL SECRETARY,-

SIE,—I have the honour to submit my Annual Report on the work of the Post and Telegraph Department for the year ended the 31st of December, 1908.

Before proceeding to discuss in detail the items of the Balance Sheet, I should like to call attention again to the practice of burdening the Postal Department with the total cost to the Colony of the various Post Cart Services.

It may be necessary that Government should encourage the establishment of Post Cart Services where Railway facilities do not exist, but unless such services are essential to the proper performance of the mail service, their cost cannot, I submit, be a fair and equitable charge against the votes of my Department.

In some cases the running of a horsed vehicle is not only not warranted—from the point of view of the Post Office—that is to say, the cost to the Department exceeds the revenue derived from the service, but it is doubtful whether it is justified by the number of passengers making use of the service. I have caused a record to be taken during the month of January, 1909, of the number of passengers conveyed by certain of these Post Carts, and I think it will be conceded that this record bears out my statement.

To take but two instances, the Vryheid-Paulpietersburg and the Dundee-Nondweni services. The Vryheid-Paulpietersburg Post Cart formerly ran on two days a week, but at the request of the residents the Government raised the subsidy from £249 to £300 a year in order to provide a service three times a week. During the month of January only ten passengers were conveyed by this cart in both directions.

The Dundee-Nondweni Post Cart is another service which is unwarranted from a Post Office point of view, and one which I have advised the Government to discontinue. The subsidy now paid is £450 a year, and the number of passengers making use of the Post Cart during January was 13 only.

If there is a genuine demand for a passenger service on any route I feel sure some person, or persons, will be found prepared to undertake it for profit without a subsidy from the Government. This is borne out by the fact that prior to the opening of the Railway line between Creighton and Riverside a passenger cart service was in existence between these two places, and also that a passenger cart continues to be run between Ixopo and Union Bridge, notwithstanding that the subsidy for this latter service was withdrawn after the 31st of December, 1908.

These are but two instances, but they are sufficient to indicate that if the Post and Telegraph Department is to be conducted on business lines, paying its own way, then the practice of charging against its revenue such expenses as the subsidies paid to the Contractors of the so-called Post Cart Services will have to be considerably modified.

Finance.—The Postal and Telegraph Revenue of the year, including the value of indirect credits, and certain free services rendered to other Departments, was £213,558 16s. 11½d. Compared with the revenue of the previous year there is a decrease of £8,926, or, approximately, 4.01 per cent.

Indirect Gredits and Free Services.—The value of the indirect credits was £4,541 2s. 1d., and of the free services £32,080 16s. $2\frac{1}{2}$ d.

Expenditure.—The Postal and Telegraph expenditure, including the value of the indirect charges, amounted, during the year, to £185,499 0s. 9d., a decrease of £2,485 12s. 8d., or approximately 1.3 per cent.

The net profit was thus £28,059 16s. $2\frac{1}{2}d$.

STATISTICS OF POSTAL PACKETS.

It is estimated that the number of postal packets delivered in Natal during the year was 21,037,520—an increase of .75 per cent, on the number delivered during 1907.

The increase of 4.08 per cent, in the number of parcels is mainly due to the introduction of the Natal Produce Parcel Post—to which reference will be found in another portion of my report.

The number and value of parcels received from the United Kingdom and Foreign Countries decreased by 8·1 per cent and 11·2 per cent. respectively, the figures for 1907 being 39,856 parcels, valued at £66,138 5s. 11d and those for 1908, 36,593 parcels, valued at £58,710 12s. 3d.

In connection with the falli. in Oversea Parcel traffic it may be mentioned that since the unit of weight of an article posted for transmission at the letter rate of postage was raised, under the Rome Convention, from 15 to 20 grammes (one ounce), numbers of packets, weighing less than one pound, formerly prepaid at the parcel post rate, are now forwarded to Natal at the letter rate.

Suggestions were put forward by two of the Inland Colonies for measures to be taken to relieve the letter post of all articles liable to duty, but I was unable to agree to them as I am unwilling to place any further obstacle in the way of the transmission of articles by post between the United Kingdom and Natal, which, by reason of the high tariff, is already sufficiently restricted.

The number of parcels sent out of the Colony to the United Kingdom and Foreign Countries was 9,263—a decrease of 6·1 per cent.—their value being £5,759 15s. 5d., as agains: £8,205 16s. 7½d. in 1907—a decrease of 29·8 per cent.

The number of letters registered during the year increased by 3.8 per cent., the figures being 161,796 for 1908, and 155,821 for 1907.

There was a considerable falling off in the number of letters, etc., poste? within the Colony during the year, the estimated number being 18,274,464, as against 20,779,824 for 1907—a decrease of 12 per cent.

A comparative statement showing the number of bags of mails and cases of parcels exchanged between Natal, the United Kingdom and other Colonies and Foreign Countries during the years 1907 and 1908 is given in the appendix. The total for 1908 shows a decrease of 1.1 per cent.

Undelivered Postal Packets.—The number of undelivered postal packets, including articles found loose and packets bearing illegible addresses, dealt with in the Returned Letter Office, is estimated to have reached a total of 174,302, being an increase of 3,767, or approximately 2.2 per cent. on the number for the previous year.

Of this number 61,773 were returned to senders residing within the Colony; 60,418 were forwarded to other countries, while 52,151 were destroyed owing to the name and address of the sender being unknown.

In addition to the articles dealt with in the Returned Letter Office, 15,833 packets of printed papers were destroyed and 21,705 postal packets were returned by Postmasters.

Articles of value, in the form of Cheques, Money Orders, Postal Orders, Bank Notes, Drafts and Postage Stamps, found in ordinary letters returned within the Colony, amounted to £1,963 13s. 10d.

Postal Customs Officers.—In order to minimise, as far as possible, the delay in the delivery of postal packets detained for inspection on the supposition that they contain articles liable to customs duty, it was decided to grant authority to Postmasters at Railway Post Offices to act as Customs Officers.

With but few exceptions all Postmasters are now empowered to assess the duty to be paid upon articles arriving by Post.

The sum collected on behalf of the Customs Department during 1908 was £8,430 3s. 10d., a decrease of 1.6 per cent.

INLAND SERVICES.

Parcel Post.—Although it has not been found practicable, so far, to reduce the rate of postage on all inland parcels, a lower rate was introduced on the 1st of April, 1908, for parcels containing articles of Natal produce and manufacture. In the latter case only those articles which are manufactured wholly of Natal produce are admitted for transmission at the special rates.

The new service has from its commencement worked smoothly and will undoubtedly become very popular with all classes, as its advantages become more generally recognised.

During the short time it has been in force approximately 5,000 parcels have been dealt with without any additional cost to the Department, beyond that incurred in connection with the printing of the forms.

The service has been of particular benefit to persons residing in Zulnland and other parts of the Colony remote from the Railway lines. It has brought within reach of many people articles of local produce and manufacture, which were virtually unobtainable in the past by reason of the high tariff and the difficulty of obtaining transport. It has, at the same time, proved of great assistance to the farmer in the disposal of certain articles of farm produce.

It is within my knowledge that persons residing in the districts of Ubombo and Ingwayuma obtain, during the winter months, fresh butter and other perishable articles from Durban by means of this service.

DELIVERY OF CORRESPONDENCE.

Private Bag Services.—In order to meet the increasing demands for private bag services in the rural districts for short periods, authority was obtained for special rates to be charged for such services. These rates have been fixed at 5s. a month where the correspondence of one person only is dealt with, and 7s. 6d. a month where two or more persons make use of the private bag.

Special Delivery of Correspondence.—In towns or villages where a house to house delivery of correspondence by postman is made, persons who are not private box holders may, on making application at the local post office, obtain correspondence arriving by mails reaching the office between the hours of delivery by postman.

Express Delivery by Messenger.—Arrangements were made during the past year for the delivery by special messenger of letters and parcels received from the United Kingdom, upon which an express fee had been prepaid in addition to the postage. This is an extension of the service which was formerly limited to the acceptance in Natal of postal packets for express delivery in the United Kingdom.

Train Letters.—In view of the facilities for later posting afforded by the system of Train Letters, an additional fee of 1d. is now charged upon all letters tendered for transmission as such between any two places having a direct main service.

Franking.—Reciprocal franking privileges have been arranged between Natal and the Orange River Colony and between Natal and North-Eastern and North-Western Rhodesia.

Parcel Post Convention.—Correspondence is passing between Natal and the Postal Authorities at Madagascar with a view to the introduction of a direct Parcel Post Service between Durban and Tulear. At the present time parcels for Madagascar are forwarded via the Island of Mauritius.

International Reply Coupons.—This Colony formally adopted the system of International Reply Coupons on the 31st of January, 1908.

Rate of Postage to Morocco.—Notice of the inclusion of the British Post Office Agencies in Morocco in the Imperial Penny Postage Scheme having been received, the rate of postage payable on letters addressed to these Agencies was reduced from 2½d. per half-ounce to 1d. per half-ounce.

MONEY ORDERS.

Statistics of Orders Issued and Paid.—The total number of money orders issued in Natal during the year 1908 was 54,499, representing a sum of £268,814 17s. 10d. Compared with the number and value of the orders issued during 1907 there is a decrease of 15,716, or 22.3 per cent., in the number, and of £41,732 15s. 7d., or 13.5 per cent., in the amount.

The decrease in the money order business is accounted for by the increasing popularity of the postal order as a means of exchange. The postal order traffic, which is dealt with elsewhere, shows an increase of more than 35 per cent.

The number of money orders issued in Natal and payable in South Africa was 20,067, valued at £103,362 14s. 11d. The number of similar orders issued during 1907 was 25,022, and their value £110,465 14s. 6d. Although the number was decreased by 19 per cent., the decrease in the amount was only 6 per cent.

The number of money orders issued in Natal and payable in the United Kingdom during the year was 22,379, and the sum represented by them £93,478 2s. 9d. The decrease in the figures for 1907 was at the rate of 29.5 per cent. in the number and 20.2 per cent. in the amount.

The total number of money orders paid in Natal during the year was 38,227, and the amount paid £209,163 0s. 4d., the net decrease in the figures for 1907 being 7,779 orders, valued at £16,132 15s. 11d.

Comparative statements of money orders issued and paid are given in the Appendix.

Advice of Payment System.—The Advice of Payment System, which was introduced in 1907, was extended during the past year to the following countries, namely:—

India,
Bulgaria,
Cyprus,
Costa Rica,
Curacoa,
Republic of Honduras.

It is estimated that 100 cases were dealt with in connection with money orders originating in Natal during 1908. As the system did not come into force between this Colony and India until October last, it is expected that the number of cases will be largely increased when the advantages of the service become generally known among the Indians resident in the Colony.

Search Fee.—A search fee of 1s. is now charged when a person applying for information concerning a money order is unable to furnish the date of issue of such order.

Money Orders to and from Papua.—Arrangements having been made for the direct exchange of money orders between Papua (formerly known as British New Guinea) and the Commonwealth of Australia, orders issued in Natal are now forwarded to Brisbane for re-issue to Papua.

POSTAL ORDERS.

The total number of postal orders issued in Natal during the year 1908 was 266,007. Compared with the number issued during 1907, namely, 196,450, there is an increase of 354 per cent. The value represented by the orders issued in 1908 amounts to£152,340 16s. 2d., being an increase of £49,597 6s. 1d. (48.2 per cent.) over the value of the orders issued during 1907.

Of orders paid, the number increased by 31.06 per cent. viz., from 199,366 in 1907 to 261,292 in 1908, the increase in the value being 35.6 per cent.

SAVINGS BANK.

The deposits and withdrawals made during the year ended the 31st December, 1908, are shown in the following table, together with the corresponding figures for the year ended the 31st of December, 1907.

During 1908 the number of depositors increased by 290, or 6 per cent., but the amount deposited was lower by £29,654 12s. 4d., a decrease of 8.7 per cent.

The withdrawals for the same period show an increase in number of 419, or 1.5 per cent., while the amount withdrawn was reduced by 6.5 per cent., the actual decrease being £22,584 14s. 5d.

The amount withdrawn exceeded the amount deposited by £13,681 14s. 4d. During 1907 the excess of withdrawals over deposits was £6,611 16s. 5d.

The average value of each deposit made during the year 1908 was £6 8s. 9d., and of each withdrawal £11 10s. 8d. For 1907 the average amounts were £7 1s. 10d. and £12 10s. 4d. respectively.

The average amount standing to the credit of each depositor on the 31st December, 1908, was £22 0s. 9d., being a decrease of £1 6s. 4d. in the amount standing to the credit of depositors on the 31st December, 1907.

Balances.—On the 1st of January, 1908, the balance standing to the credit of Depositors was £502,673 8s. 9d., and at the end of the year £488,991 14s. 5d.

Interest.—The total amount of Interest paid during the year 1908 was £15,723 17s. 10d., and for the year 1907 £15,764 18s., a decrease of £41 0s. 2d. Included in the amount for 1908 is the sum of £14,284 4s. 8d., Capitalised Interest drawn on June 30th, 1908.

Average Rate of Interest Paid.—The average rate of Interest for the year 1908 was approximately 31 per cent, practically the same as that for the previous year.

Number of Depositors.—The number of accounts open on the 31st of December, 1908, was 22,190, an increase of 665 on the number open on the 31st December, 1907.

Average Amount to Credit of each Depositor.—The average amounts standing at the close of the years 1907 and 1908 to the credit of each Depositor, classified according to race, were as follows:—

Indian Depositors.—On the 31st of December, 1908, there were 2,043 Indian Depositors compared with 1,847 on the 31st December, 1907, being an increase of 196. The total amount standing to the credit of the Indian Depositors on the first-named date was £41,760 5s. 5d., and on the 31st of December, 1907, £36,955 0s. 11d., being an increase of £4,805 4s. 6d.

Native Depositors.—There were 432 accounts open a the end of 1907 and 504 at the end of 1908, being an increase of 72. The balances were £8,260 10s. 9d. and £9,390 17s. 10d., respectively.

That so few Natives should take advantage of the Post Office Savings Bank is most disappointing, and I am taking steps that will, I trust, make the service more popular among the Native population.

Unclaimed Fund.—The amount standing to the credit of the Unclaimed Fund on the 31st December, 1908, was £4,596 4s. 6d., made up as follows:—

Investments.—The amount invested on 1st January, 1908, was £321,401 4. 9d., and on 31st December, 1908, £320,334 19s. 7d., a decrease of £1,066 5s. 2d. This is accounted for by the re-investment in Natal $3\frac{1}{2}$ per cent. stock, of £100 South Anstralian 4 per cent. stock which matured on the 1st of January, and of £900 of the same stock which matured on the 1st of July.

• Number of Branches.—The number of branches open on 1st January, 1908, was 56, and on the 31st December, 1908, 59—an increase of 3. The following new offices were opened:—Hatting Sprnit, Creigian, Kearsney and Umbogintwini, while the Boshoff Street Office, Pietermaritzburg, was closed.

Management.—The cost of management for the financial year 1907-8 was £3,905 18s. 7d.

General.—The Telegraphic withdrawals during the year 1908 numbered 3,797, being an increase of 720 as compared with the previous year. The number is made up as follows:—

Revenue amounting to £20 was derived from the sale of duplicate Pass Books during the year.

The number of withdrawals at sight (Head Office only), for which a fee of one shilling is charged, amounted to 3,057, a decrease of 74 as compared with last year.

On the 1st March, 1908, the system of transferring Savings Bank Accounts from one Administration to another was extended to the Cape Colony, at the same rates of commission chargeable in the case of transfers to the United Kingdom, and certain other Colonies.

Particulars of the transfers to and from Natal and other Administrations during the year ended the 31st December, 1908, are given in the following table:—

The sum transferred to Natal was exceeded by the sum transferred from Natal by £2,904 7s. 7d.

The amount earned as commission on the transfer of accounts was ± 20 3s 10d., being at the rate of 1d. for every £2 or fraction thereof transferred.

While people generally are not so well off now as they were during the two or three years following the end of the Boer War, a greater number are making use of the Bank, and this is probably on account of the Post Office being more convenient for the transaction of Savings Bank business than Magistracies.

I have strongly urged the Government to authorise me to make payments of withdrawals by cash instead of by cheque, as is done in England and in other parts of South Africa, in order to meet the wishes of the majority of Savings Bank depositors, but so far the Government has not, I regret to say, been able to fall in with my recommendation.

TELEGRAPHS,

Receipts.—The Telegraph receipts for the financial year ended the 30th June, 1908, amounted to £42.404 17s. $1\frac{1}{2}$ d., compared with £45,623 14s. 7d. for the previous financial year, a decrease of £3,218 17s. $6\frac{1}{2}$ d., or approximately 7.05 per cent.

The estimated value of the free services, including £159 2s. 5d., the value of the rebate allowed on messages forwarded on behalf of the Imperial Military Authorities, is £9,718 5s. 10d.

Traffic.—During the year ended the 31st December, 1908, 1.518,148 telegrams passed over the Department's lines. Compared with the number for the previous year, namely, 1.579,061, there is a decrease of 3.8 per cent. The total number of transactions decreased by 77,072, the figures being, for the year 1908, 1,967,451, and, for the year 1907, .044,523.

On the 31st December, 1908, there were 212 offices open for the transaction of telegraph business, 120 of which were situated at Railway Stations.

Three additional Offices were opened during the year for the transaction of public telegraph business, Umbogintwini on the Sonth Coast Railway Line; Malongeni, on the Dundee-Vryheid Branch Line; and Winter's Kloof, on the Main Railway Line.

Four Telegraph Offices were closed, viz.:—Moguntia, Boshoff's Road, Merebank and Good Hope.

TELEPHONES.

Receipts.—The receipts from Telephone business for the financial year totalled £9,587 ls. $9\frac{1}{2}$ compared with £8,682 9s. $7\frac{1}{2}$ d. received during the previous year, an increase of £904 l2s. 2d., or 10.4 per cent. The revenue derived from the Trunk Telephone system continue to show a steady increase, the amount received during 1907-1908 being £2,729 16s. $0\frac{1}{2}$ d., against £1,815 15s. $6\frac{1}{2}$ d. received during the financial year ended the 30th June. 1907, an increase of £914 0s. 6d., or more than 50 per cent.

It is estimated that in addition the Department performed free services of the value of £828 5s. in respect of official telephone connections which it was called upon to provide, and £111 4s. 10½d. in respect of conversations held over the Trunk lines. There was also a loss of £523 on the Zululand Telephone line which connects up all the Magistracies with the Commissioner's Headquarters at Eshowe.

On the 1st of June, 1908, an important alteration in the tariff of Telephone charges was carried out; the practice hitherto followed of fixing the charge upon a mileage basis for conversations held over the Trunk Telephone lines within the Colony being abandoned, and, in its stead, a uniform rate of 1s. 6d. being larged for each call of three minutes' duration passed between any of the Exchange area. No. 1.

The adoption of a uniform te, which, although slightly higher than the rate formerly in force between Maritzburg and Durban, enables conversations between Durban and the up-country Exchanges and Call Offices to be held for nearly half the former charge, has resulted in a greatly increased use of the Trunk Lines.

Prior to the change being made, the average number of calls dealt with each month from January to May was 2,770. From June—the month from which the new tariff took effect—until December, the number of calls dealt with each month averaged 3,995, the increase being at the rate of 44.2 per cent.

Cable Traffic.—A statement giving particulars of the Cable Traffic is appended.

The full amount of the subsidy to the Eastern and South African Telegraph Company, viz., £825, has, I regret to say, again been paid to the Company for the year 1908.

The following are the more important works carried out by the Engineering Staff during the year:

from Durban to Capetown. These dischargers were designed specially for this line by the Cable

Company's Engineers in London, their object being to nentralise as far as possible the effects of atmospheric electricity on the line, and so eliminate irregularities which cause signals to be distorted, resulting in errors in messages and delays in transmission. The experiment is an interesting one, but the dischargers have not been long enough in use for a correct estimate to be formed of their value.

- 2. The extension of the Trunk Telephone System to Vryheid.
- 3. The installation of a Telephone Exchange in the Post Office, Durban, for the nse of the South African Convention. This Exchange connected up the various offices occupied by the Delegates to the Convention and their Staffs, and by its means communication was also available with the subscribers to the Durban Municipal Exchange, and with the Department's Trunk Lines. The system worked with complete satisfaction.

I am much indebted to His Worship the Mayor of Durban, through whose kindness special wires were erected for the use of the National Convention between the Post Office and the Municipal Exchange.

4. The erection of an additional wire between Maritzburg and the Cape border (Union Bridge). This wire was urgently needed in order to strengthen the Department's system of telegraphic communication with the Cape Colony, and its erection in time for use during the sitting of the National Convention at Durban was a great advantage.

During the year several works were carried out for the Railway Department, the more important of which are the following:

- 1. The construction of 1 Telegraph line along the Esperanza-Donnybrook Railway, which was begun at the end of 1907.
- 2. The erection of a Metallic Circuit between Glencoe Junction and Dundee for the purpose of the Electric Train Staff working.
- 3. The extension of the Telegraph line along the Natal-Cape Railway from Creighton to Riverside.
 - 4. The construction of the Telegraph line along the Railway between Vryheid and Hlobane.

Staff.—The number of persons on the establishment of the Post Office on the 31st December, 1908, was 298, a decrease of 8 during the year. In addition there were 609 unestablished persons employed, as compared with 601 during the year 1907.

The number of Natives employed was 375, a reduction of 62 in the number employed in the previous year. The saving by this reduction is at the rate of, approximately, £1,302 a year.

Among the established officers there were six retirements during the year and two transfers to other Departments.

The bonus of £5, awarded to Telegraph Messengers for proficiency in studies, was gained by 23 boys.

Double increments were awarded to three officers of the Department who qualified in special scientific subjects.

On the 24th of August the Railway Station at Stamford Hill, which is also the Post Office, was broken into, but an attempt to rifle the safe was not successful. No Post Office property was stolen.

On the 7th of November, a Native named Ustulman Zondi was sentenced by the Magistrate at Estcourt to four months' imprisonment with hard labour for fraudulently obtaining money in respect of a stolen Money Order.

During the year the business of the Department has gone on smoothly and well, the complaints received from the public being comparatively few. For this satisfactory result I am indebted to the loyal and willing way in which the officers of all ranks have worked. In several cases the need for the strictest economy has made it necessary to introduce hours of attendance for the sorting clerks which are irregular, and I fear, in some cases irksome, but the Staff, appreciating the position in which the Department is placed, has cheerfully fallen in with the arrangements made, and when it is remembered that an attendance may have to be made at any hour of the day or night—some duties beginning as early as 3 a.m., the cheerfulness of the staff to fall in with the revised duties will be fully appreciated.
